Did You Know???

Great white shark population grows off California

An increasing number of great white sharks swimming off the California coast means people have a lot of learning to do.

Chris Lowe, director of the Shark Lab at CSU Long Beach, said the shark population is recovering at at time when more and more people are swimming, surfing and paddle boarding along the coast.

But over the past 50 years, before protection efforts and cleaner water led to a rising shark population, people haven't had to share the ocean with predators. "We've become predator-stupid, and we've got to change that," Lowe said, speaking to a packed room at Channel Islands National Park's Ventura headquarters last week. "It's their environment, and we're going to have to adapt our behavior so we can use the ocean safely," he said.

That's where technology comes in.

From smart tags, which are kind of like Fitbits for sharks, to acoustic tracking devices and drones, researchers have learned more about the great whites over the past 10 years or so. Researchers now are working to develop underwater robots to track the sharks and ways to detect their DNA that sheds in the water.

"Our goal is future real-time sampling of white sharks along our beaches," Lowe said. "There are lots of opportunities to take this science and not only use it to make our beaches safer, but hopefully, get it to the point where we can share the ocean with the animals we've worked hard to bring back." That includes identifying hot spots along the Southern California coast where juvenile white sharks tend to hang out over the spring and summer.

Using historical fishing records and tracking data, researchers identified the white shark nurseries off Ventura, Santa Monica, Huntington Beach and Dana Point. "What we would see throughout the summer, sharks would move from one hot spot area to another hot

spot area," Lowe said. They would stay at any one area for 40 to 50 days before moving on. Typically, when water temperatures dipped below 60 degrees in October or November, sharks would migrate south.

But a few years ago, the water stayed warm — above 65 degrees — and the young sharks stayed. "They stayed all year round, and the next spring, a new batch of newborns show up, and my phone starts ringing," Lowe said. It looked like the white shark population had exploded. Instead, El Niño conditions had just changed the sharks' behavior.

Even without those more extreme changes, sharks tend to pick different beaches at different times, Lowe said last week. Sharks might hang out near a particular beach during a few summers. But then they'll move to a spot off a nearby beach the next summer.

"We know there are hot spot areas and within those areas, there are hot spot beaches," Lowe said. "But we don't know what would make a hot spot beach a hot spot beach any given summer."

In Ventura, surfers, boaters and others said they started seeing more and more white sharks off beaches. Most of the sharks were babies, from 5 to 6 feet long. At that age, the juvenile whites stick to safer, shallower water away from large predators feeding on stingrays and fish along the bottom of the ocean. Aggressive behavior is rare, experts say, but people should leave them alone.

Emily Meese, a graduate student at CSU Long Beach, has studied sharks for several years and helped Lowe and others track and tag the baby whites off Southern California. She said she hopes people see the increasing shark population as a good sign and learn more about the species.

"A lot of people get scared that there are more sharks in the water," she said. "But it is a good sign that things are doing better."

Beach Dive May 20 Fisherman's Cove, Laguna Beach 7:00 AM

Fisherman's Cove (AKA Boat Canyon) is a small cove with a tiny beach, well protected from the surf; the sand drops off quickly. Portions of the reef can be shallow, but are generally 15 to 20 on average. Around the base of the reef, in the sand the water depth is about 25 to 30 feet. Skirt along the edges and

look for the many large cracks that leads into the reef.

Mermaids Grotto is a hole in the reef off Fisherman's

Cove. The cracks leading to the grotto are only about 3 feet wide, or just wide enough for a diver to pass through. The top of the reef is at about 15 feet and the bottom of the cracks and holes are at about 25 feet. Not a huge vertical drop, but enough to make it fun.

The site is populated with the usual Laguna Beach residents, Garibaldi, Sand Bass, Opaleye, Zebra Perch, small gobies, rockfish, urchins, Octopus, rays and nudibranchs. A very enjoyable place to dive, especially at night.

To get to Fisherman's Cove in Laguna Beach turn south at the traffic light on Beverly street from PCH. The signal has a sign for Beverly street, but when you turn south you are going

onto Cliff Drive. The road forks immediately on Cliff drive, stay to the left going onto Cliff Drive and go about 200



yards. The staircase to Fisherman's Cove is just before the last apartment building (looking south, towards the beach). The steps to the cove are just past (or before, depending on where you parked) the entrance to Divers cove right next to the apartment building.

Hey Beach Divers Be careful Parking in Laguna Beach

LAGUNA BEACH — Tickets for parking violations that impair public safety — at a red curb, next to a fire hydrant, too close to a fire station, and in certain other no-parking zones — will cost violators \$63 beginning May 10, a 46 percent increase over the current fine.

The City Council on Tuesday, April 10 voted 4-0, with Councilwoman Toni Iseman absent, to increase the penalty of the violations.

Other fines — including for parking at a yellow, white or green curb, over marked lines or in an intersection or driveway — will remain at \$43. Parking in a spot designated for disabled drivers without the proper permit will remain \$300, the city's stiffest parking fine.
