February Speaker

Cheryl McCarron

Education and Program Director Shark Angels

Cheryl McCarron, Shark Angels resident "Shark Nerd".talked to us about "the State of the Sharks, 2023". There have been some interesting, and not always pleasant discoveries and updates to our shark knowledge base in 2023.

We know of over 440 species of sharks. In 2023, we lost 23 species to extinction due to, among other more minor causes, over fishing, habitat destruction, pollution.

We discovered a new shark species, the Demon Cat Shark.

Contrary to popular belief, with the exception of about 12 species of shark, they do not need to keep moving in order to "breathe". Of course we know that because most of us have come across sleeping Reef and Nurse sharks. They did discover some interesting behaviors in the population of 12, where they would rest facing a current to keep water flowing through the gills. They also suspect, that like Dolphin, sharks can shut down half their brain and keep the other half awake.

97% of the time, in California, Great White Sharks (GWS) are in close proximity to surfers and swimmers, yet shark bites are extremely rare. Worldwide, there were 10 people killed by sharks and 69 unprovoked shark bites.

73 million sharks were killed last year. An unsustainable rate.

Reef Shark population has declined by 60 -73%

Cheryl mentioned that shark is contained in sunscreens, anti-aging creams, lotions, hair conditioners, deodorants, eye shadows, lip balms, lipstick, and face cleansers. Additionally, health supplements, pet food, alternative medicine products and even wallets, purses and jewellery.

Shark meat is sold and served under many different names including grayfish, whitefish,

lemon fish, cape steak and many others. Not only is this depleting the shark population, but as a peak predator, shark meat contains high levels of Mercury (1.8 PPM, whereas .5 PPM is generally considered maximum safe level), lead, Arsenic and the biotoxin BMAA.

Shark Angels continues to advocate for sharks and we can do our part by contacting our legislators about loopholes in current shark overfishing and by-catch regulations, educating our contacts about the threat to sharks and the oceans, avoiding products containing shark, and of course contributing to shark advocates like Shark Angels.

March 17 Beach Dive Moss Street, Laguna Beach 7:00 AM

Moss Street Beach is at the end of Moss Street in Laguna Beach. Take coast Hwy and turn on Moss Street (toward the ocean). Parking may be found along Moss Street and on Ocean Way.

Beach access is via a staircase which leads down to the rather intimate beach.

Moss Cove offers two distinctive dive spots -

South-East or to your left from the stairway You'll find Scattered rocks and a series of Parallel reefs rising 20 feet from the sandy bottom. Several with a sharp drop-offs, all interesting to explore.

South or to your right from the stairway there are several "mini" reefs with lots of promise for exploration. This area is generally shallower.

The entry is fairly easy and straightforward. The bottom drops off rapidly five or six feet.

The site contains many small walls and ledges with some of the rocks towering some 18 feet off the bottom. There is a wide variety of marine life here. Gorgonians, Feather Worms, Anemones, lobster as well as the usual suspects Sheephead, Garibaldi, Kelp Bass and so on.

CHAMBER DAY & EVE 2024 IS COMING

Chamber Day 2024 officially opens for business this Friday so this week is our last-minute scramble to get everything in place. We have seven boats (119 spots) participating in the Day, the Flying Dutchman (unlimited spots), the Chamber Challenge (always a key factor in our final tally), Chamber Evening at the Aquarium of the Pacific (we're expanding from 300 to 350 seats available this year due to demand), and virtual Chamber Evening with a link to our live stream for those who can't make it in person.

Best of all, 2024 represents the 50th year that our Chamber has been around. It became operational on October 5, 1974, treated the first patient a week later, and has been helping divers ever since. So we hope to make a lot out of 50 years of service to the diving community.

But all of this can't happen without direct help from you. This event lives (or dies) by word-of-mouth. In the next day or so, I'll be sending you cut-and-paste articles you can use for your newsletters, websites, or e-mail blasts to your flock. We're in the process of finalizing the logos for Day, Eve, and Dutchman and will get those to you too.

Some of you are boat &/or table sponsors and have already been filling you spots. So what we really need from everyone - especially if you're a shop, club, or independent instructor - is to reach out to your folks, emphasize how important our Chamber is, and encourage them to donate and get involved.

We bill Chamber Day as the largest single-day charity scuba event in the U.S. and we're pretty sure that's not an exaggeration as, when you tally all those who participate and those who volunteer their time to make it all happen, it involves over a thousand people.

We had a great year last year and hopefully we can set a new fund-raising record this year. This is really an "ecumenical" event that works best when the entire diving community is involved.

Wetsuit Recycling Program

I just read about this recycling program for used wetsuit and want to pass it along.

A wetsuit recycling program, a partnership between equipment supplier Scuba.com, Lava Rubber and the Diveheart Foundation has been launched.

The program aims to repurpose and turn old wetsuits into usable items such as:

Yoga Mats.

Welcome mats.

Coasters.

Koozies and much more.

The program aims to make wetsuits more sustainable and environmentally friendly, since neoprene is not biodegradable.

Divers who want to recycle their old suits can drop them off at Scuba.com retail locations in Costa Mesa, CA

For every wetsuit donated to Scuba.com's stores in NYC and Costa Mesa, California, divers will receive a token of appreciation: 15% off their next wetsuit purchase, redeemable in-store only.

Wetsuit donations can be also sent directly to Lava Rubber to be upcycled.

Oil Slick Spreading to Bonaire

An oil slick from a grounded barge off Tobago is traveling west with the currents and wind and has reached Bonaire. Authorities in Bonaire said the oil posed "a serious threat to both humans and nature".

It's not very clear who the owner of the barge is and there were no crew on board. Tobago declared a national emergency on Feb. 11 and has been trying to contain the spillage from the continuing leaks.

Officials in Bonaire are particularly concerned for the mangroves on the Island's east side which are among the best preserved in the Caribbean.

Daylight Saving Time is Here Again March 10, 2:00 AM

Well it's that time again. If you look at the title above, it is Daylight **Saving** Time, not Daylight SavingS time. First implemented in Germany in 1916 to save fuel in WW I. The United States adopted it in 1918 and was standardized in 1966 with the Uniform Time Act.

The reason Daylight Saving Time starts at 2:00 a.m., rather than midnight, is all thanks to the railroads: Amtrak, specifically. When the country first experimented with Daylight Saving Time in 1918 during World War I, there were actually no trains that left New York City at 2 a.m. on a Sunday. That was when they would interrupt the least amount of train travel around the country
